June 27, 2018 – The BC First Nations Public Service Secretariat (FNPSS) and the Institute of Public Administration of Canada (IPAC) have announced a renewed Memorandum of Understanding to formalize their partnership.

By sharing research, information, experience, expertise and skills, IPAC and the BC First Nations Public Service Secretariat have agreed to undertake joint programming, research, resource materials and publications as appropriate to foster and support excellence in public administration.
