Reminders from the ISC Funding Services Team

- Audited Consolidated Financial Statements: Although the Department is unable to grant an extension to the requirement for First Nations to complete audited consolidated financial statements within 120 days of year end (i.e. by July 29), the Department has stopped all discretionary compliance measures related to the First Nation Financial Transparency Act. Recipients other than First Nations have been granted a 90-day extension for audited consolidated financial statements.
- No measures will be taken for late reporting:
 At this time, and until further notice, ISC and CIRNAC will not take any measures related to the late submission of any report that is required under your funding agreement. This includes measures such as the halting of funds, the downgrading of General Assessment scores and the initiation of default management action.
- Adjustments to reporting requirements are being explored: As well, please note that ISC and CIRNAC are currently exploring what other reporting requirement adjustments can be made related to any





outstanding Fiscal Year 19-20 reporting requirements and upcoming Fiscal Year 20-21 reporting requirements. We will formally communicate these adjustments as soon as they are confirmed.

Completed Program Reports can be submitted:
 For communities that have their reporting requirements completed, BC Region will accept, review and approve reports, as per usual process. For a complete list of Reporting Requirements, including templates, please refer to the department's Reporting Guide on our website.

Ongoing Efforts to Support Cultural and Heritage Organizations

The Government of Canada is announcing an emergency investment of \$25.7 million to help Cultural, Heritage and Sport Organizations maintain essential services and be ready to reopen their doors to the public once precautionary measures are lifted.

The first component of Phase 2 of the COVID-19
Emergency Support Fund for Cultural, Heritage and
Sport Organizations, launched in May 2020, is also being
implemented. This component provides \$53 million
in support to organizations with heritage collections
through the emergency component of the Museums
Assistance Program of through the Department of
Canadian Heritage. Eligible not-for-profit organizations
such as museums, archives, historic sites, Indigenous
organizations, official-language minority communities,
or municipal and university museums with separate
budgets, will now be able to apply for funding.

COVID-19: Canadian Seafood Stabilization Fund opens June 22

As of June 22, 2020, applications from Indigenous and non-Indigenous fish and seafood processors in the West will be accepted for the Canadian Seafood Stabilization Fund (CSSF). The fund is a \$62.5 million investment to help fish and seafood processors in Western Canada, Quebec and Atlantic Canada get through the crisis and prepare for economic recovery, so that their communities can continue to thrive.

Western Economic Diversification Canada has been allocated more than \$9 million in funding from Fisheries and Oceans Canada to support fish, seafood and aquaculture processors across Western Canada and the administer applications.





Canada and provincial partners re-open the Canadian Fish and Seafood Opportunities Fund

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced Wednesday that the Government of Canada has worked with provincial and territorial partners to re-open the Canadian Fish and Seafood Opportunities Fund (CFSOF) to support the industry in accessing new consumer markets.

Launched in 2018, the CFSOF is a national cost-sharing program that helps the fish and seafood sector address new market-access issues and identify branding opportunities.

Applicants will now have the chance to submit an Expression of Interest (EOI) to the CFSOF at any time, making the program more nimble and adaptable to changing circumstances brought on by COVID-19.

Eligible applicants under the CFSOF are not-for-profit industry organizations (e.g. associations and Indigenous groups) operating on a national, regional or sector-wide basis in the fish and seafood sector who are active in or supporting marketing related activities. Applicants operating on a regional basis must demonstrate that they represent significant production within their sector and have the ability to deliver a project from a national perspective.

Province supporting First Nations' transition to clean energy

The Province's Renewable Energy for Remote Communities (RERC) program is providing \$1.86 million for a transmission line to connect 28 homes to the Xeni Gwet'in community's hybrid clean energy micro-grid, reducing diesel consumed for electricity generation by about 50,000 litres per year.

"The community has always supported achieving self-sufficiency with alternative energy sources," said Chief Jimmy Lulua of the Xeni Gwet'in First Nations Government. "Xeni Gwet'ins' living standards will improve with the completion of the underground line microgrid extension project, and we will continue to work with RERC to build a healthier British Columbia."

The Xeni Gwet'in First Nation clean energy project is one of four to be funded under the \$16.5-million RERC program which helps remote communities shift to renewable energy, moving away from polluting diesel generators to cleaner energy sources.

Other communities benefiting from the program are the Hesquiaht First Nation, Dzawada'enuxw First Nation, and the Kitasoo/Xai'xais First Nation.

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Province provides grants to support people, rural economies

The Province of BC has announced nearly \$14 million in grants for over 150 projects to support economic development and recreational opportunities for British Columbians in rural communities throughout the province. The grants include approximately \$5 million for 39 trail and recreation projects, and almost \$9 million for 114 projects that support rural community development. Among the recipients is the Williams Lake Indian Band (WLIB) that received \$500,000 to build a cannabis production facility. The 557-square-metre (6,000-square-foot) facility will have 200 square metres (2,150 square feet) of growing space and will be located by the retail cannabis store WLIB launched last March.

"We're extremely grateful for the generous support of the Province of British Columbia," said Williams Lake Indian Band Chief Willie Sellars. "The last five years have been very challenging for the Cariboo – with the Mount Polley disaster, the wildfires of 2017 and now the COVID-19 crisis. The WLIB cannabis cultivation project will help to kick-start our economy, create new jobs and stimulate tourism. This project represents a huge opportunity for the Williams Lake Indian Band and the Cariboo-Chilcotin."

LOCAL FOOD INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has launched a second call for proposals under the Local Food Infrastructure Fund. The Fund aims to strengthen food support organizations and to help improve access to safe and nutritious food for Canadians at risk. Applications will be accepted on a continuous basis until funding has been allocated. Projects valued at up to \$250,000 will be accepted.

New Resource Helps Cannabis Producers Enter the Legal Market

Cannabis producers looking to enter BC's legal market can now use a step-by-step online guide that helps simplify and streamline the licensing process. The **Cannabis Production Regulatory Navigator** is a guide for businesses of all sizes for cultivating (such as growing and harvesting) and processing (including manufacturing and packaging) for commercial purposes in BC. To date, there are 66 standard cultivation licence holders, 10 micro-cultivation licence holders, five nursery licence holders, 51 standard processing licence holders and two micro-processing holders in the Province.
