***A BASIC GUIDE TO NAMES**
 Listed below are the First Nations Peoples as they are generally known today with a phonetic guide to a common pronunciation. Newcomers to those phonetic pronunciations may still find a huge gap between what they say and what they hear a native speaker saying. The best way to learn these names is to listen closely when in the presence of someone more familiar, and perhaps even ask for a quick lesson. Also included here are names formerly given these groups, and the language families to which they belong.

 ** Although Coast Salish is not the traditional First Nations name for the people occupying that region, this term is used to encompass a number of First Nations Peoples including Kwakwaka'wakw, Haisla, Gitksan, Sekani, Nisga'a, Heiltsuk, and the Coast Salish peoples of the Fraser Valley, including the Squamish, St'at'imc, and the Chilliwack.
